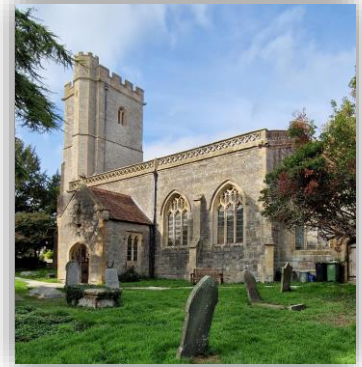

It was great to have 25 members at our AGM on Saturday 11th October at Ashcott. The service and meeting were held in the church after an hour of ringing for all.



The meeting opened by remembering Peter Welch from Middlezoy who died 2nd July 2025, and Michael Hart of Burnham-on-Sea who died 19th July 2025.

The future of our branch participation in striking contests was discussed by the meeting, and it was agreed to revert to a six-bell competition at the April meeting. This will allow selection of the successful bands to represent us at the association contests later in the year, or failing that, give us time to form a branch band. The eight-bell representation would continue to be drawn from participants in the 8-bell practices.

Ringling Master's Report-2025



Overall, this has been a good year for ringing, both in practices and standards of ringing. It is so good to see attendance at the various practices remain high; let's go for even higher in 2026. The first 8-10 Practice was very well received, after the practice I had several ringers asking if we could have more of these. At the AGM I announced that for 2026 there would be two of these practices.

It is very pleasing to note that the overall standard of striking has continued to improve this year, and more ringers are happy to try out different methods.

As always recruitment can be an issue, so often we see new ringers, who we think are doing really well, suddenly drop out. This isn't just a Branch problem; it is something that happens everywhere. I had been teaching two new ringers (14 years old) in Middlezoy, really keen and doing well, then exams loomed, and they attended less and less, now they have completely dropped out. The problem is that when people do stop, getting them back is a massive problem. If anyone has an idea of a way of solving this please step forward, a lot of thinking outside of the box is probably required.

Association Striking Competitions

This year there was a 'hiccup' in the organisation for this and getting teams organised for both the 6 and 8 bell entries became a major headache. It soon became apparent that providing a team for the 8 Bell was not going to happen so focus was on the 6 bell. Unfortunately, due to circumstances I had to withdraw myself and my sincere thanks go to Charles Pipe-Wolferstan for taking up the reins and running our Branch team. My thanks also to Michael Munt for finding replacement ringers to finally make up the team. The competition was very close with only 9 points separating all 7 teams, and 5 points between first place and sixth, which was our Branch. Hopefully next year will see fewer 'hitches'.

Cossington 800 – 12 July 2025

When I was asked to organise some ringing for this event I decided to include a special composition as the opening ringing, this would be a composition made up of both Minor and Doubles methods, and total 1,800 Changes.

A strong band of ringers from various towers made ringing this long 'Quarter Peal' possible and on one of the hottest days of the year so far (around 32 Degrees C) we successfully completed the ring in a good time of 61 minutes.

Sad to report that Gerry Brown, a very long standing and reliable Bridgwater branch member died peacefully 19th October 2025 in Musgrove hospital aged 88. His daughter Shirley was beside him.

Gerry has long been associated with Cannington, Bridgwater and Durleigh ringing. He rang 31 peals, conducting 2, and rang in some 1176 quarter peals, conducting 280, around the branch and the association.

Gerrys funeral will be at St. Mary's Church, Cannington TA5 2HS at 12.45 on Tuesday 4th November, then to the crematorium, TA6 4SR at 2pm. There will be a wake at Rich's Cider Farm from 2:45. There will be open ringing from 12:00.

Michael Hart, 3rd October 1939 to 9th July 2025

Father Michael Hart, a recent Branch member at Burnham on Sea, died on 9th July 2025.

His funeral was held at the church of Our Lady and The English Martyrs, Burnham on Sea, on 22nd August.

Michael had a long association with bellringing, having first learned to ring in the mid-1950s in Oswestry. He conducted his first peal at Whittington in the early 1960s and became a keen peal ringer, even ringing 4 peals in one day!

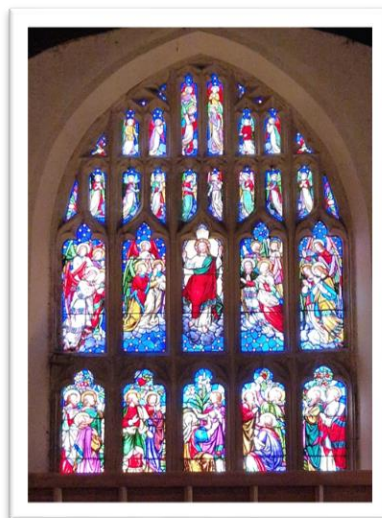


He had been ordained at Lichfield Cathedral in the late 1960s. He became a well loved and respected priest latterly in Pembrokeshire when he retired.

After his retirement Michael became a catholic and was ordained in 2016 in Walsingham Abbey where he became a part-time chaplain. Michael moved to Burnham-on-Sea in August 2020 to be nearer his family and continued to assist the local parish priest in Burnham on Sea.

He joined the Bridgwater Branch and continued to enjoy his bellringing right up to a month before his death.

Matthew Higby Visit

On Saturday 23rd August 21 ringers from the Bridgwater Branch gathered at the Charmborough Farm Rural Business Park to visit Matthew Higby's engineering works. Matthew is a renowned local, national and international ringer and all-round guru on everything bell ringing. His company, started as a sole trader in 1996, specializes in the conservation, restoration or replacement of church bells, together with their associated fittings and supporting frameworks, in addition, the Charmborough Farm site is also the site of the Potter's Yard Campanile.



The afternoon started with a brief but fascinating presentation, by Matthew, covering the work of his business, a little of how new bells are cast (not done on site), old bells are restored and something of the black art of tuning of bells, once done by "adjusting" the bell metal with a hammer and a tuning fork, but these days a giant lathe and sophisticated computer software are better suited to the job.

The presentation concluded with a brief look at bells as historical artefacts, special bells worked on and the role of the Keltek Trust in bell conservation.

With newly acquired knowledge we were allowed to explore the "factory floor" and see, up close, the work in progress, bells, wheels, headstocks, bearings and bell frames.

As bellringers we are usually separated from the bell hardware by a length of rope, it was therefore interesting to be taken to a clean area of the works where bell ropes are manufactured.

The process is quite simple; flax fibres are spun into a yarn; 12 lengths of yarn are twisted by a machine into strands and finally 3 strands are twisted together to form the rope.

Matthew demonstrated the process in the ropewalk and explained how the sally is inserted during the twisting and finally shaped on the finished rope.

The afternoon concluded with a visit to Potter's Yard Campanile, built and installed by Matthew and his colleagues. This is a 12-bell mini-ring with a tenor weighing just over 1cwt.

The original bells were cast, in the 1980's, by the Whitechapel foundry, now fitted to steel wheels and with counterbalanced clappers to improve the handling of the bells.

Everybody who wished to were able to have a go, for some this was the first time ringing on a very light ring of bells but after a few pulls, to get the measure of the bells, rounds, call changes and even plain hunt were rung on 12 bells.

Rightly proud of his creation, Matthew makes the Potter's Yard Campanile available, by prior arrangement, to bands of visiting ringers for quarter and even full peal attempts...*something for a branch outing in the future perhaps?*



It is fair to say that a very interesting, informative and enjoyable afternoon was had by all. Thanks are extended to John Hallett for organising the visit and of course to Matthew Higby, for giving up an afternoon of his limited spare time to host us in his workshop.

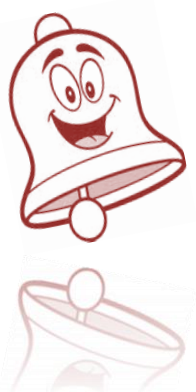
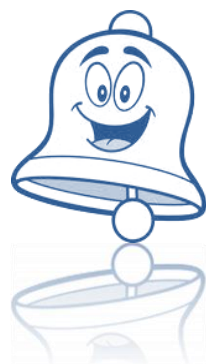
